Hastings Embroidery in the Triodome on Hastings Pier

In 1966, the Hastings Corporation built the Triodome on the parade extension to house The Hastings Embroidery, it was produced by the Royal School of Needlework as the main feature of the 1966, 900 year celebrations of The Battle of Hastings. It was the suggestion of Group Captain Ralph Ward, the Celebrations Organiser.

The Embroidery is partly applique, done by hand, and is given depth and variety by the use of threads, cords and metals. Materials used included tweed from Scotland, fabrics from the Victoria and Albert Museum, and feathers from London Zoo, for the Red Indian feathers in the Boston Tea Party scene. To achieved the effect of fire in the Armada scene and the Great Fire of London an overlay of nylon net was used.

It consists of 27 panels, each 9 foot [2.7432 metres] long by three feet [9144 cm.] high, making a total of 243 feet [74.0664 metres]. The panels display 81 pictures depicting the most important events in the history of this country in the 900 years up to 1966. It was originally housed on Hastings Pier in the purpose built Triodome.

After the Hastings Embroidery was moved out, there were amusements in the Triodome, followed by the zoo called the Zooquarium, which was a petting zoo, with a circular section in the middle where children could lean over and pet the animals. Caged creatures were around the outside. They were all small animals, birds, and reptiles, nothing large. The Zoo closed in 1974 to be replaced with an amusement arcade. The Triodome was finally dismantled in 1986 and sold to Brighton Pier.
